## **Alan F. White**

***Senior Associate Dean of the MIT Sloan School of Management***

Alan White is Senior Associate Dean at the MIT Sloan School of Management responsible for MIT Sloan programs in Asia, Europe, and Latin America. His extensive international experience includes

a major institution building assignment in Singapore and direction of innovative MIT Sloan management education projects now going forward at selected universities in China and Korea.

Mr. White's activities in Asia encompass Korea, Japan, Taiwan, Thailand, Malaysia, Singapore, Indonesia, and China. In China he is

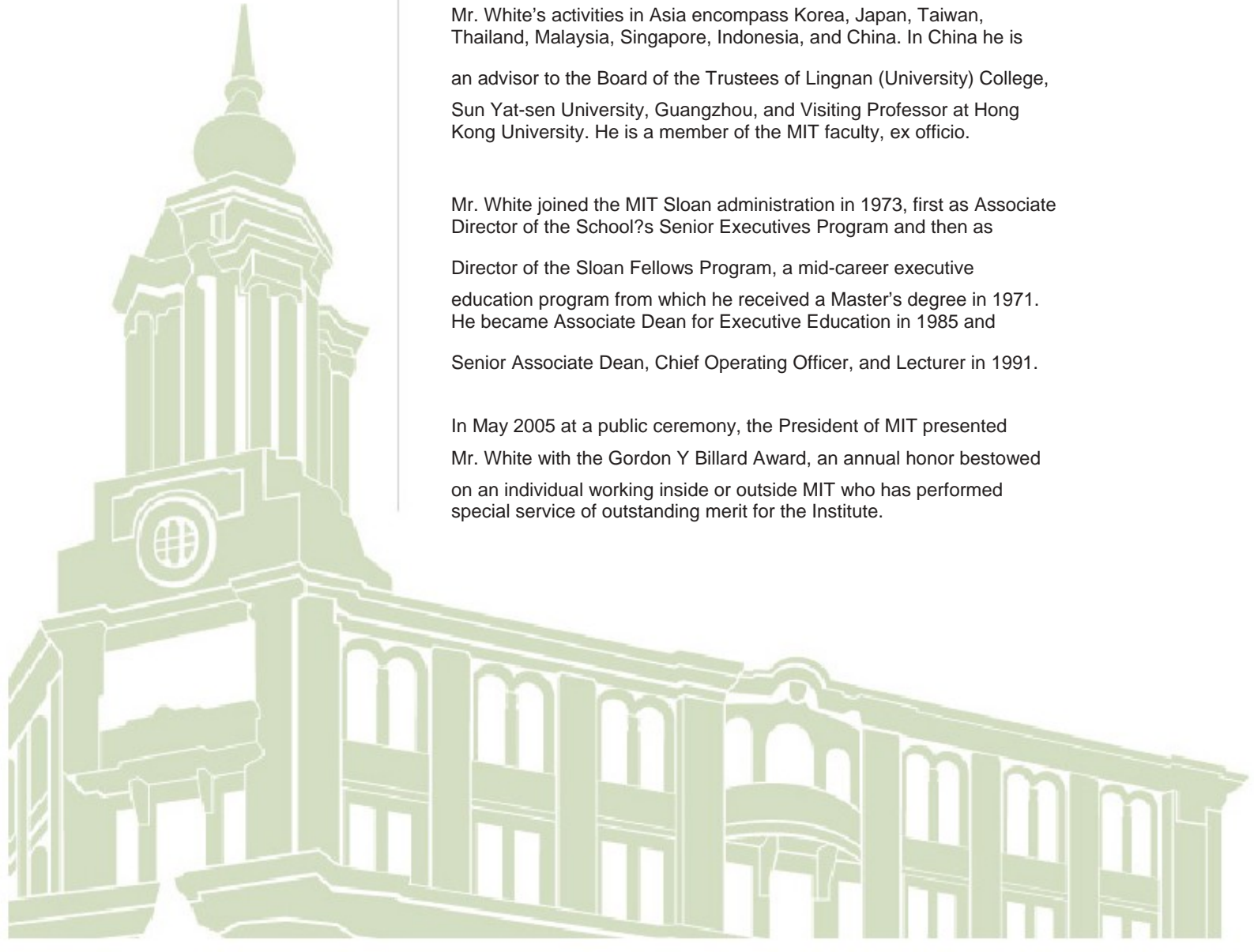
an advisor to the Board of the Trustees of Lingnan (University) College, Sun Yat-sen University, Guangzhou, and Visiting Professor at Hong Kong University. He is a member of the MIT faculty, ex officio.

Mr. White joined the MIT Sloan administration in 1973, first as Associate Director of the School's Senior Executives Program and then as

Director of the Sloan Fellows Program, a mid-career executive education program from which he received a Master's degree in 1971. He became Associate Dean for Executive Education in 1985 and

Senior Associate Dean, Chief Operating Officer, and Lecturer in 1991.

In May 2005 at a public ceremony, the President of MIT presented Mr. White with the Gordon Y Billard Award, an annual honor bestowed on an individual working inside or outside MIT who has performed special service of outstanding merit for the Institute.

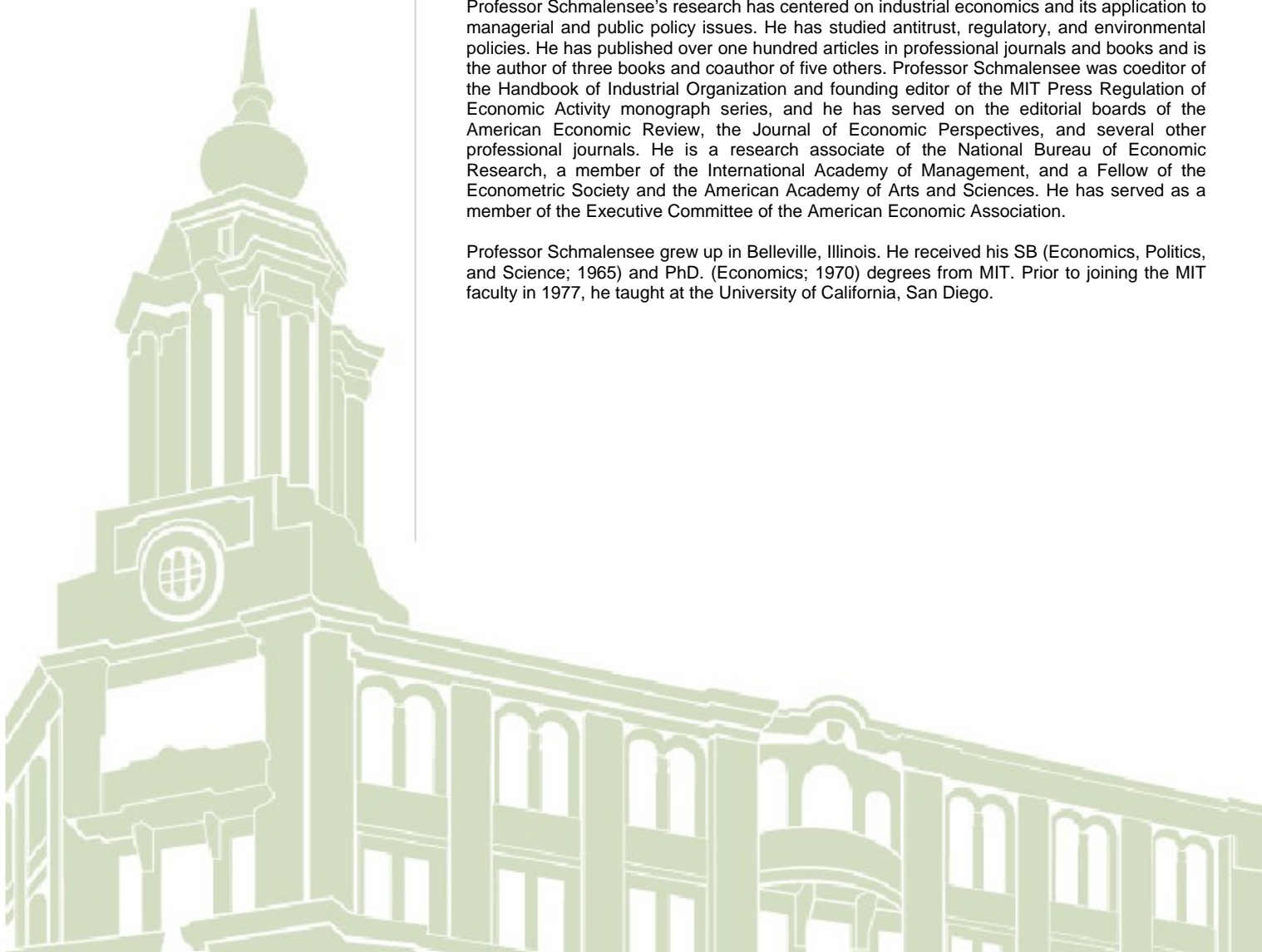
## **Professor Richard Schmalensee** ***Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT)***

Richard Schmalensee is Professor of Economics and Management at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) and has been the John C Head III Dean of the MIT Sloan School of Management since 1998.

Professor Schmalensee was a member of the President's Council of Economic Advisers from 1989 through 1991 and a deputy dean of the MIT Sloan School from 1996 through 1998. He has served as director of the MIT Center for Energy and Environmental Policy Research, as a member of the Environmental Protection Agency's Environmental Economics Advisory Board and as chairman of its Advisory Council on Clean Air Act Compliance Analysis. He has also served on the Committee on National Statistics of the National Academies. He is a director of the International Securities Exchange and of MFS Investment Management.

Professor Schmalensee's research has centered on industrial economics and its application to managerial and public policy issues. He has studied antitrust, regulatory, and environmental policies. He has published over one hundred articles in professional journals and books and is the author of three books and coauthor of five others. Professor Schmalensee was coeditor of the Handbook of Industrial Organization and founding editor of the MIT Press Regulation of Economic Activity monograph series, and he has served on the editorial boards of the American Economic Review, the Journal of Economic Perspectives, and several other professional journals. He is a research associate of the National Bureau of Economic Research, a member of the International Academy of Management, and a Fellow of the Econometric Society and the American Academy of Arts and Sciences. He has served as a member of the Executive Committee of the American Economic Association.

Professor Schmalensee grew up in Belleville, Illinois. He received his SB (Economics, Politics, and Science; 1965) and PhD. (Economics; 1970) degrees from MIT. Prior to joining the MIT faculty in 1977, he taught at the University of California, San Diego.

## **Dean Zheng Zukang** ***Fudan University***

Born in Shanghai in July, 1947 of Han nationality, Zheng Zukang is a professor and a supervisor of doctoral candidates. He was one of the central commissioners of "Jiu San Society" and a member of the standing committee in Shanghai district. In addition, he was a director-commissioner of Fudan University and a member of the Ninth Shanghai Political Consultative Conference. From 2001 to 2005, he occupied the deputy director of the high school mathematics and statistics directory committee, and the director-commissioner of the statistics teaching directory subcommittee.

Zheng Zukang became a student of the mathematics graduate school of Fudan University in 1978. Later in 1980s, he went to study in U.S. and got the doctor's degree in Columbia University in 1984 and returned to China to be a teacher in the same year.

Successively, he has acted as the deputy director, director of the Statistics Planning Department, deputy dean and standing deputy dean of the Management Department. At the same time, he was the director of the Statistics Department. Zheng Zukang became the dean of the Management Department of Fudan University in December, 2000. While in July, 2001, he was elected as one of the vice presidents and dean of Management Department.

Mr. Zheng had held and attended many national projects on natural and scientific fund. He did very well in mathematics and statistics, focusing mainly on existence analysis, order analysis and non-parameter, etc. His publications include over 70 papers and one monograph. Now he is the standing director of National Probability and Statistics Committee, the associate director of Chinese Engineering Probability and Statistics Committee, the standing director of Chinese Statistics Education Committee, the standing director of Shanghai Mathematics Committee and the associate director of Shanghai Statistics Committee.

Many times, he traveled to the countries like U.S. Canada, Australia, Japan, Norway and France for academic meetings and investigations.

Besides the honor of "Model Worker of Shanghai", he was also the winner of National May Day Medal. What's more, he was named by the Ministry of Education and the Ministry of personnel "the most contributive person to China's socialist modernization".
