Lee C. Bollinger

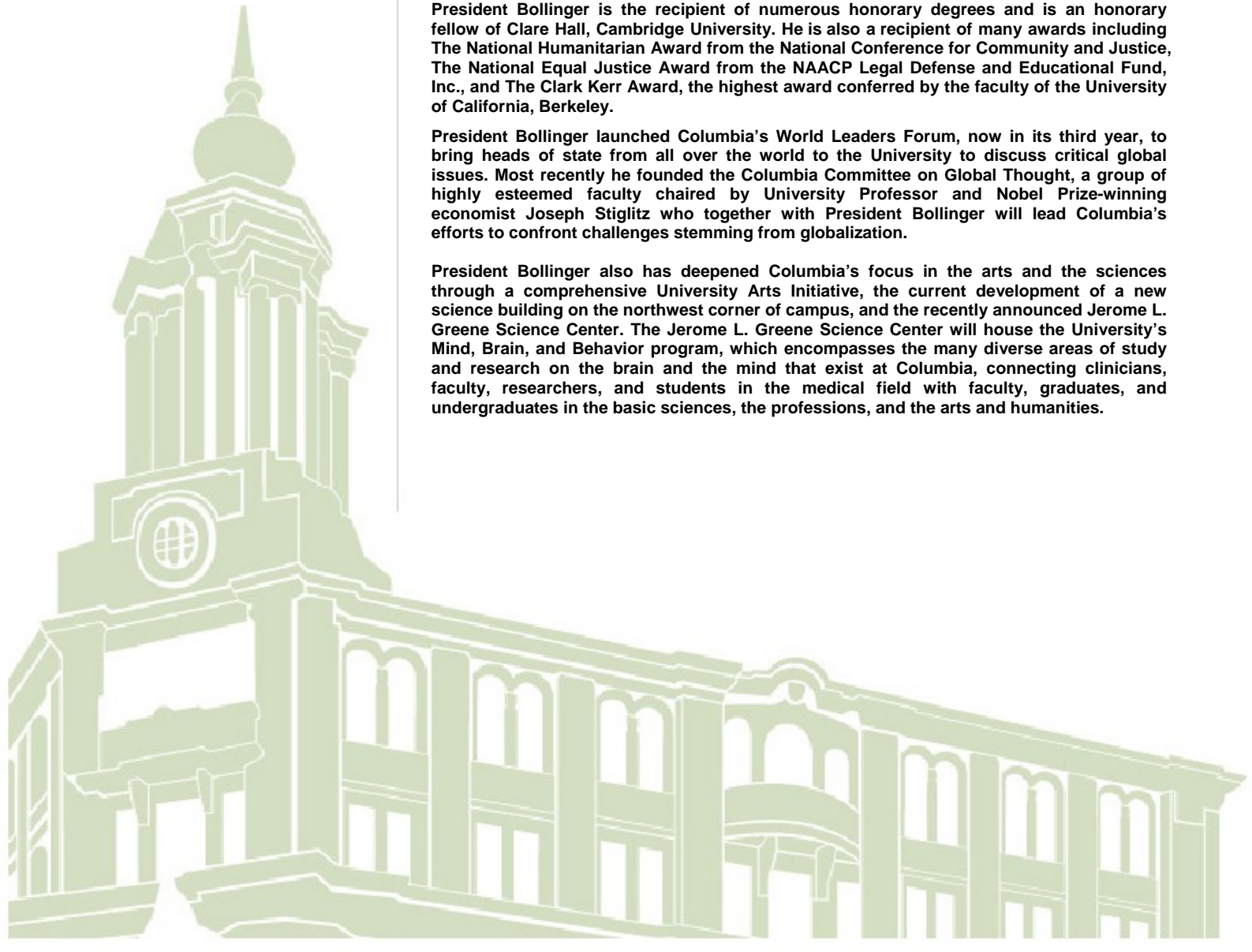
President of Columbia University

Lee C. Bollinger is President of Columbia University in New York City and a member of the faculty of the Law School. He is a graduate of the University of Oregon and Columbia Law School. After serving as law clerk for Chief Justice Warren Burger on the United States Supreme Court, he joined the faculty of the University of Michigan Law School in 1973. In 1987 he was named the Dean of the University of Michigan Law School, a position he held for seven years. He became Provost of Dartmouth College and Professor of Government in July 1994 and was named the twelfth President of the University of Michigan in November 1996. His primary teaching and scholarly interests are focused on free speech and First Amendment issues, and he has published numerous books, articles, and essays in scholarly journals on these and other subjects.

President Bollinger is the recipient of numerous honorary degrees and is an honorary fellow of Clare Hall, Cambridge University. He is also a recipient of many awards including The National Humanitarian Award from the National Conference for Community and Justice, The National Equal Justice Award from the NAACP Legal Defense and Educational Fund, Inc., and The Clark Kerr Award, the highest award conferred by the faculty of the University of California, Berkeley.

President Bollinger launched Columbia's World Leaders Forum, now in its third year, to bring heads of state from all over the world to the University to discuss critical global issues. Most recently he founded the Columbia Committee on Global Thought, a group of highly esteemed faculty chaired by University Professor and Nobel Prize-winning economist Joseph Stiglitz who together with President Bollinger will lead Columbia's efforts to confront challenges stemming from globalization.

President Bollinger also has deepened Columbia's focus in the arts and the sciences through a comprehensive University Arts Initiative, the current development of a new science building on the northwest corner of campus, and the recently announced Jerome L. Greene Science Center. The Jerome L. Greene Science Center will house the University's Mind, Brain, and Behavior program, which encompasses the many diverse areas of study and research on the brain and the mind that exist at Columbia, connecting clinicians, faculty, researchers, and students in the medical field with faculty, graduates, and undergraduates in the basic sciences, the professions, and the arts and humanities.





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Tu Qiyu

Assistant President of Shanghai Academy of Social Sciences

Professor of Shanghai Academy of Social Sciences

Dr. Qiyu Tu is Assistant President and Professor of Shanghai Academy of Social Sciences with specialties in International Economics, Development Economics and Urban Strategic Planning. In 2001 and 2002, he taught Economics in New York's Bard College as Fulbright Professor and still keeps the record as the youngest Fulbright Professor in China. Dr. Tu has been a visiting scholar at Cambridge University, Harvard University, Fondation Nationale des Sciences Politiques, and Hamburg Institute for Economic Research.

Dr. Tu's book "Institutional Innovation: the International Political Economy of Monetary Integration" won first prize from the Shanghai Social Sciences Foundation in 2000. He is also co-editor of two books under the topic of urban studies. Dr. Tu was named by the Shanghai Youth League as Man of the Year 2003 in Economics or Business. And in 2004, the Shanghai Municipal Government awarded him first prize for Decision-Making Consultation and the Excellent Service Award for Returning Talent from Overseas.
